Thought of the week

The shape of the U.S. Treasury yield curve is, by no means, a perfect predictor of the economy's future, but it does signal what market participants think about the economy and Fed policy.

A "normal" or upward-sloping curve, which has occurred 73% of the time since 1962 (as shown in this week's chart), reflects a generally stable outlook for economic growth, inflation, and monetary policy. It slopes upward because, all other things being equal, investors demand compensation for the extra risk in holding longer-term bonds. An inverted curve is typically a sign of an impending recession, implying that investors expect the Fed to cut short-term rates to battle economic weakness. A flat curve indicates gradually slowing growth or inflation, allowing the Fed to ease gradually. A humped curve suggests the Fed is expected to raise rates aggressively to address hot inflation but then ease back when the economy has slowed. Lastly, there is the rare U-shaped curve, which is the shape of the yield curve today. It suggests current Fed rates are too high compared to those expected 2-3 years from now, but elevated long rates imply that investors will continue to demand a premium due to rising fiscal deficits and long-term inflation.

Given today's U-shaped curve, investors may want to be more cautious about the extremes. Holding too much cash poses reinvestment risk, and long-end rates may stay volatile. Investing in bonds with 2-3 year maturities may present an attractive middle ground.

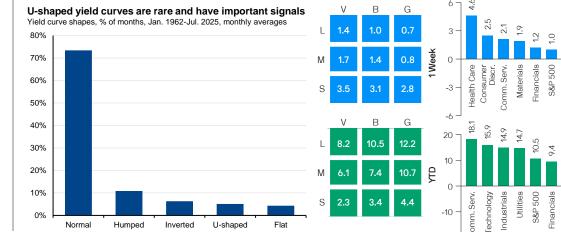
